Letter to Parents

BACKGROUND:

From time to time, school districts review the boundary lines between schools to make enrollment adjustments. With the anticipated opening of the new Lowell Elementary building in January of 2022, Waterloo Schools has considered the need to adjust the Lowell Elementary and Kittrell Elementary boundaries in effort to balance enrollment between the two schools.

- Lowell Elementary has been our smallest elementary school, currently serving approximately 280 students.
- Kittrell Elementary is currently our largest elementary, serving approximately 570 students.
- The new Lowell Elementary building will be bigger than the previous building, with a capacity to serve 450+ students.

A boundary study committee has been meeting to review the boundary lines between Lowell Elementary and Kittrell Elementary with the goal of shifting some future Kittrell Elementary students to Lowell Elementary. The committee is proposing a boundary change as outlined on the attached map, with the following key points:

- The southern boundary of Lowell moves to Bourland Ave., between Baltimore St. and LaPorte Rd., and East Mitchell Ave. between LaPorte Rd. and Lowell Ave.
- The western boundary of Lowell moves to Baltimore St., between Bourland Ave. and Byron Ave.
- The eastern boundary of Lowell moves to LaPorte Rd. between Bourland Ave. and East Mitchell Ave., and Lowell Ave. north to the existing Lowell boundary.
- The southern boundary of Irving between West 9th St. and Baltimore St. does not change.
- All Bourland Ave. addresses in the re-zoned area will attend Lowell Elementary.

In an effort to maintain consistency in education, families residing in the proposed re-zoned area will have the following options for their student(s):

- Students enrolled at Kittrell Elementary at the start of the 2022-23 school year may stay at Kittrell through the completion of their 5th grade year.
- Siblings of students enrolled at Kittrell Elementary at the start of the 2022-23 school year may stay at Kittrell through the completion of their 5th grade year.
- Families residing in the re-zoned area with students enrolled at Kittrell Elementary at the start of the 2022-23 school year may enroll their student(s) immediately at Lowell Elementary if they choose to do so.

• Families residing in the re-zoned are with no students enrolled at Kittrell Elementary at the start of the 2022-23 school year will be zoned to Lowell Elementary.

If approved, this boundary change would take effect **beginning with the 2022-23 school year**, and will not impact current Kittrell Elementary students.

504.2 Standardized Dress Code

FOR INFORMATION ONLY

STANDARDIZED DRESS CODE

Dress Code Rationale, Beliefs and Benefits

lowa law provides that the students, the instructional staff and the administrative staff of lowa's public schools have the right to be safe and secure at school.

The Waterloo Community School District Board of Directors has determined that a mandatory (standardized) dress code is necessary for all elementary, middle, and high school students to ensure that they attend school in a very positive and safe educational environment and to reinforce the District's mission that each and every student graduate prepared for college, career, and citizenship. The board believes that any apparel worn at school that draws attention away from the school's learning environment should be prohibited.

The board believes that the health and safety of the students and staff are of paramount concern and that any apparel that might jeopardize student or staff health and safety should be prohibited.

Finally, the board believes that a standardized dress code helps to prepare students for their futures through:

- Focusing on instruction and creating a learning mindset
- Learning about professional/career dress by establishing a businesslike image
- Going to school in an environment of modesty/decency
- Focusing on instruction
- Keeping them personally safe by providing a high level of school security
- Developing a sense of school pride, and belonging, and unity
- Symbolizing uniqueness as a district

Pants / Skirts / Dresses / Bottoms

The following pants/skirts/dresses/bottoms may not be worn in the Waterloo Community Schools:

- Any type of cargo or carpenter bottoms with large pockets attached to the exterior
- Any type of sweat pants/athletic uniform bottoms/shorts or similar
- Bottoms of any type of material, that are form-fitting to the body
- Yoga Pants, skateboard pants, stirrup pants, or jeggings, or similar
- Any type of jeans or overalls
- Any bottoms with prints, patterns, embroidery, colored trim, words, symbols, decoration or similar
- Bottoms with excess/nonfunctional buttons
- Bottoms with beads, extra zippers, things hanging off the clothing, chains, large brand tags, or similar
- Bottoms whose length is above the knee
- Pajamas or other clothing meant to be worn as sleepwear
- Bottoms in any shade of green, yellow, light blue, medium blue, red, orange, purple, or whitenot solid in color
- Bottoms with holes, rips, or voids

- Bottoms that permit undergarments to be visible
- Bottoms that are revealing or undersized (too tight)
- Bottoms that are more than one size too large (too loose)
- Bottoms whose waist is worn more than one inch below the natural waistline
- Bottoms that have belt loops that are worn without a belt in grades 6-12
- Bottoms that are sheer or see-through
- Bottoms that drag on the floor

Shirts / Tops / Dresses

The following shirts / tops (tops) may not be worn in the Waterloo Community Schools:

- Tops that have multiple-color plaids, checks, multiple-color stripes, embroidery, prints, words, symbols, or decorations, or similar in accordance with logo constraints (logos larger than 2" [height and width] except for Waterloo school-specific logos)
- Tops that have excess buttons, extra zippers, things hanging off the clothing, colored trim, or similar
- Tops that are without collars <u>unless Waterloo Schools specific</u>
- Tops that are sleeveless or capped-sleeved
- Tops that are t-shirts, except school t-shirts on designated days
- Tops that are school athletic or activity apparel (except by members of recognized school groups on designated days
- Tops that are halters, tanks, tubes, bare midriff, spaghetti strapped, backless, and/or off-the shoulder tops, or similar
- Tops that are revealing
- Tops that are hooded
- Tops that have holes, rips, or voids
- Tops that allow undergarments to be visible
- Tops that are tight or too loose (Plus or minus more than one size)
- Tops that have a logo larger than 42" (whose height or width is more than 42") except for Waterloo school-specific logos
- Tops that are sheer or see-through
- Tops that are frayed

Footwear

It is not permissible to go without shoes except while participating in a school activity such as swimming or gymnastics where shoes are not appropriate. The following footwear may not be worn in the Waterloo Community Schools:

- Sandals or similar
- Crocs or similar
- Flip Flops or similar
- Open-Toed shoes
- Shoes with heels above two inches
- Slippers or house shoes/house boots, or similar
- Shoes with fabric soles
- Any shoe not meant for outdoor wear

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- Wheelie/Heely shoes (shoes with skates in the bottom) or similar
- Any shoe with a spiked heel

Head Wear

The following head wear may not be worn in the Waterloo Community Schools:

- Hats, hood part of the hoodie, visors, caps, bandanas, hairnets, scarves, or similar, as well as items that are distracting or pose a safety hazard (ex. Birthday hats/crowns/holiday headwear)
- Sunglasses, unless prescribed by a physician for indoor use

Belts

The following belts may not be worn in the Waterloo Community Schools:

- Belts with buckles whose height is more than the approximate height of the belt
- Belts with excessive metal (more metal than is necessary for the functioning of the belt)
- Chains or chain belts
- Belts with studs (i.e. metal or rhinestones or similar)
- Belts with any type of protruding object
- Belts with words or graphics that are disruptive, distracting, or offensive, in language or symbols in grades PK-5.
- Belts with words or graphics in grades 6-12.
- Belts with excess buttons, extra zippers, things extra hanging off the belt, or similar object(s)

<u>Jackets / Sweaters / Vests / Sweatshirts / Outdoor Weight Scarves / Gloves</u>

Certain outer-wear apparel is not permitted in classrooms, hallways, or common areas other than passage to and from the student's locker or coat room upon arrival to or departure from the main building. The following lighter weight jackets, fleeces, sweaters, vests, and sweatshirts may not be worn in the Waterloo Community School District classrooms, hallways, or common areas during the school day:

- Those with multiple-color plaid, checks, multiple-color stripes, pattern, embroidery, decoration, words, graphics, printed design, or similar in accordance with logo constraints (logos larger than 2" [height and width] except for Waterloo school-specific logos)
- Those with excess buttons, extra zippers, things hanging off the clothing, or similar extras
- Hooded garments
- Garments with holes, rips, or voids
- Garments that are fringed
- Jackets/sweaters/sweatshirts/fleeces without a collared shirt underneath (unless the garment has a collar or is worn with another collared shirt is Waterloo Schools specific)
- Items with logos larger than 24" in width or length, except Waterloo school- specific logo apparel

SCHOOLS

Layered Clothing

The following clothing, usually worn as a layer with other clothing, may not be worn in the Waterloo Community Schools:

- Any t-shirts (unless Waterloo Schools specific), camies, or tanks, unless with approved tops (the combination may not be collarless)
- Those with any shade of plaid, checks, stripes, printed design, words, or symbols

Leggings/Tights

The following may not be worn in the Waterloo Community Schools:

- Leggings worn as pants without additional bottom/top at knee length in PK- grade
- Leggings or footless tights in grades 6-12
- Any tights, pantyhose, or nylons that are not neutral-colored or that are of one of the prohibited bottom colors: any shade of medium or light blue, green, yellow, red, orange, purple, or white, in grades 6-12
- Tights of fishnet fabric
- Tights with any patterns, stripes, plaids, designs, words, or symbols in grades 6-12

Accessories

The following accessories may not be worn in the Waterloo Schools

- Bandanas or visible handkerchiefs
- Jewelry that could be used as a weapon
- Excessive jewelry (jewelry that is distracting or poses a safety hazard)

Other

It is not permissible to wear any item that may be used as a weapon, including, but not limited to, steel-toed shoes/boots, chains, items with spikes or studs, and other items deemed inappropriate by the principal.

<u>Implementation</u>

This policy applies to all elementary, middle and high school students and was implemented District-wide beginning with the 2011-2012 school year.

Additional, School-Specific Rules

Each school site may develop, with the approval of the District dress code committee, additional rules which are more restrictive than the District Dress Code policy and regulation, but shall not permit items prohibited herein. Schools are responsible for notifying their students and parents/guardians in a timely manner of their building's additional Dress Code rules.

PROPOSED 504.2

Exceptions

Exceptions to the Dress Code will be made for students with IEPs, religious beliefs, JROTC uniforms, or health conditions that require accommodations.

Regulation

The superintendent will develop regulations to implement this policy.

Savings Clause

In the event that any administrative or judicial body declares any portion of this policy or any attending regulation illegal, the remaining portion of this policy or attending regulation not declared illegal shall remain in full force and effect without further action by the District.

It was moved by Mr. Williams and seconded by Ms. Mills that the Board of Education accept the recommendation of the Finance Committee to recertify and adopt the 2021-22 Budget with maximum expenditures of \$214,762,849 and property tax levy rate change from \$14.20694 to \$13.84754 as recalculated with a deduction of \$1,000,000 as presented. Michael Coughlin, Chief Financial Officer, along with members of the Board Finance Committee, provided information. Motion carried 6-0.

VIII. Resolution Fixing the Date of Sale of School Infrastructure Sales, Services and Use Tax Revenue Refunding Bonds and Approving Official Statement

It was moved by Mr. Knight and seconded by Ms. Johnson that the Board of Education approve the resolution fixing the date of sale of approximately \$31,910,000 School Infrastructure Sales, Services and Use Tax Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 2021 and approving the Official Statement. Michael Coughlin, Chief Financial Officer, provided information. Motion carried 6-0.

RESOLUTION FIXING THE DATE OF SALE OF APPROXIMATELY \$31,910,000 SCHOOL INFRASTRUCTURE SALES, SERVICES AND USE TAX REVENUE REFUNDING BONDS, SERIES 2021 AND APPROVING THE OFFICIAL STATEMENT

WHEREAS, pursuant to Iowa Code Chapters 423E and 423F, the Board of Directors of the Waterloo Community School District (the "Issuer") is currently entitled to receive proceeds of the statewide School Infrastructure Sales, Services and Use tax; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to an election duly held in the District in accordance therewith on March 3, 2020, and pursuant to Iowa Code Chapters 423E and 423F, the Board of Directors of the Waterloo Community School District approved a Revenue Purpose Statement and is currently entitled to expend proceeds of the statewide School Infrastructure Sales, Services and Use tax; and

WHEREAS, the Board finds it advisable and necessary that Bonds authorized at the election be offered for sale for the purpose authorized at the election, and it is in the best interest to issue Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the Board deems it in the best interests of the School District and the residents thereof to negotiate for the purchase of the School Infrastructure Sales, Services and Use Tax Revenue Refunding Bonds;

Now, Therefore, It Is Resolved By The Board Of Directors Of The Waterloo Community School District In The County Of Black Hawk, State Of Iowa:

Section 1. That the School Infrastructure Sales, Services and Use Tax Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 2021, in the aggregate amount of approximately \$31,900,00 (the "Bonds"), to be issued and dated July 8, 2021, be offered for sale.

Section 2. That the preliminary Official Statement in the form presented to this meeting be and the same hereby is approved as to form and deemed final for purposes of Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities and Exchange Commission, subject to such revisions, corrections or modifications as the Superintendent and Board Secretary, upon the advice of the District's Financial Advisor, shall determine to be appropriate, and is authorized to be distributed in connection with the offering of the Bonds for sale.

Timberline Billing Services Contract

BACKGROUND:

Medicaid is a federal/state cost sharing benefit program for health and medically necessary services for low-income individuals that was established as Title XIX of the Social Security Act in 1965. Originally, Medicaid benefits could not be used for services provided under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). In 1988, the Medicare Catastrophic Coverage Act allowed Medicaid to pay for covered medical services provided to Medicaid-enrolled children with special health care needs on their individualized education program (IEP) or individual family service plan (IFSP).

Within the Iowa Department of Education, there are three aspects to reimbursement from the Iowa Medical Assistance Program (Medicaid). A Local Education Agency (LEA) is a community school district that is able to seek reimbursement for services provided to children requiring special education with services identified on an IEP. An Area Education Agency (AEA) is a regional service center able to seek reimbursement for services provided to children requiring special education. The Early ACCESS Program also allows reimbursement for services to children from birth to age three with at least a 25% developmental delay and services identified on an IFSP.

The process of identification, documentation and submission of qualifying services follows strict guidelines. School districts contract with specialized service companies to assist and maximize the level of reimbursement possible. The Waterloo District has greatly expanded the utilization of Medicaid reimbursements in the last 5 years. The district requested proposals from the companies that work within Iowa. Timberline Billing Service of West Des Moines, IA., ClaimAid of Waukee, IA and M.J. Care of Milwaukee, WI.

Ivan Gentry, Director of Special Education, recommends the following company for continuation of the Medicaid Billing Services for the Waterloo Community Schools: Timberline Billing Service [TBS].

- 1) Waterloo has a relationship with TBS and with this partnership Waterloo Schools has increased the billing total by changing to electronic claims which expediates payments to the district. Over 600 staff have been trained in TBS's new T-Trak program. Along with customized reporting, on-site support, and knowledge of our district, we anticipate the amount to increase with the continuation of coordination with TBS.
- 2) Central Rivers AEA is a client of TBS and Waterloo coordinates billing for student needs at the school of River Hills and other AEA programs. Continuing with TBS would allow

- continued seamless coordination with these schools as they currently assist in preparation of paperwork and submission of claims directly to TBS.
- 3) TBS has submitted a five-year proposal at 6% which allows for an expected fee in regards to budgeting. This bid is slightly higher, but a review of the services offered support the decision to continue with TBS.
- 4) TBS in the past has offered college scholarships for students with IEPs after they graduate. Waterloo appreciates the stewardship this communicates to families. Student Applicants must be from a TBS client district.

BACKGROUND:

For school budget year 2020-21 the District received federal funds from the American Rescue Plan Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund [APR ESSER]. The direction of the funding was to address safety issues, technology and instructional expenses to address the achievement gap created because of the pandemic. During the 2020-21 school year, the pandemic limited athletic events, student performances and the public attendance of such.

During the 2020-21 legislative session, the following resolution was adopted to support the Student Activity Fund. [Fund 21] The resolution is in effect from 2020-21 through 2022-23. The recommended amount of transfer for 2020-21 is based on student activity revenues through of May 2020-2021 as compared to May 2018-2019. Any future transfers will be based on student activity fund needs in 2021-22 and 2022-23 school budget years.

IOWA RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, Iowa Code provides school districts greater flexibility to transfer funds to the student activity fund:

WHEREAS, the superintendent has determined that due to COVID-19 restrictions during the 2020-2021 school year, some cocurricular or extracurricular activities' funding may be insufficient to meet the financial needs of those activities;

WHEREAS, the superintendent, has recommended that funds of \$1.235,000 in the general fund be transferred to the student activity fund to fund cocurricular or extracurricular activities that fail to meet their financial needs as a result of COVID-19 restrictions in the school budget year beginning July 1 2020.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Board that funds of \$1,235,000 in the general fund be transferred to the student activity fund to fund cocurricular or extracurricular activities that fail to meet their financial needs as a result of COVID-19 restrictions in the school budget year beginning July 1, 2020.

THE SUPERINTENDENT'S RECOMMENDATION IS:

"that the Board approve the resolution that funds in the amount of \$1,235,000 from the general fund be transferred to the student activity fund to fund co-curricular or extracurricular activities that fail to meet their financial needs as a result of COVID-19 restrictions in the school budget year beginning July 1, 2020."
