Teach Waterloo: Building Tommorow's Teachers Today

A University of Northern Iowa and Waterloo School District partnership to increase the number of minority teachers to support student success



Addresssing the Gaps

K-12 schools nationwide are more racially diverse than ever before. For the first time, non-white students now account for the majority of public school students.

Yet despite changing student demographics, racial representation among teachers is lagging behind, and research suggests this may limit students' achievement and potential. Studies have shown that having a teacher of color in a classroom can increase the likelihood that students of color complete high school and aspire to attend college.

Teach Waterloo Program

In 2018, the Waterloo School District and the University of Northern Iowa formed the Teach Waterloo partnership to diversify the teacher workforce in support of student success. The Teach Waterloo participants, known as program "fellows," are drawn from current paraeducators and behavioral intervention specialists whom the district recommends to enroll in the program. Three fellows graduated in 2020, and eight are currently enrolled in Teach Waterloo.

Program Details

- Provides minority fellows a path to earn elementary education teaching licensure
- Graduates have a three-year agreement for employment with Waterloo Schools
- Fellows are provided wrap-around supports, including advising and success coaching, textbooks and scholarships
- Waterloo Schools provides a liaison for fellows and the flexibility to attend class while remaining employed

Diversifying the Teacher Workforce

In lowa, there is a gap in representation across the teacher workforce. Among the state's largest school districts — where the majority of students are non-white — the Waterloo School District has the largest percent of minority teachers with just 6%. Approximately 55% of the Waterloo public school students identify as racial or ethnic minorities.

Teach Waterloo is based on a previous program at Wartburg College funded by the R.J. McElroy Trust that demonstrated this ripple of impact. From 1994–1999, the program produced 31 teachers/administrators of color who each went on to serve an average of 21 years in the Waterloo School District.

Support Teach Waterloo

Generous investment from the R.J. McElroy Trust launched the Teach Waterloo program and supported the first group of Teach Waterloo fellows. UNI is now seeking additional investments to continue the program's impact.

The program's primary expense is the cost of tuition and fees — an average of \$25,000 for each Teach Waterloo fellow. Recognizing Teach Waterloo fellows may have greater financial need than the typical college student, we endeavor to bridge the gap between available financial aid and scholarship assistance to erase financial barriers to their participation.
